John (Jean) Octav Aubain was born on March 15, 1926 to his parents Louis Aubain and Ann Louise Olive, now deceased.

He attended St. Peter and Paul School through the 8th grade. In 1947, John moved to New York where he worked at the Park Sheridan Hotel. He served in the U. S. Army during the Korean War and was honorably discharged in 1952.

In November of 1952 John met Elizabeth Melanie Quetel and on January 2, 1953 they were married. In 1953, he returned to New York where he continued to work at the Park Sheridan Hotel. John returned to St. Thomas in June of 1973.

In 1974, John lost his sight to glaucoma. But that did not get him down. John loved fishing, but his favorite past time was sports.
