Eulogy

Pauline Olive came into this world on February 8, 1916. She was one of seven children born to Vitalis and Emilia Greaux. She attended the Catholic School under the guidance of the Redemptorist Fathers and the Sisters of Charity.

Pauline enjoyed growing up in Frenchtown and often reflected on the many limitations that existed during the depression and the years that followed. The virtues of faith, hope and charity propelled Pauline and supplied the ingredients for her married life.

On September 4, 1938, Pauline married Edward Olive. Their marriage gave life to five children, John Marcel, Dennis, Tony, Bernadette and Margarita. As the children grew, family life dominated Pauline's everyday style. Guided by and with the assistance of her two sisters, Sister Jean Bernadette and Sister Josephine Marie, Pauline stressed the importance of good education. Her christian principles commanded respect and provided a good example for her children.

She served her church and community in her own way. Membership in the St. Anne's society and attending Mother of Perpetual Help services molded her love for the Blessed Mother. When possible, basket weaving, provided relaxation. This gift she shared with the other ladies of French Village.

In 1967, Pauline realized an economic benefit as she moved into a new home. She was now more prepared to help her children by offering a new environment for her grandchildren.

Her new kitchen provided great joy as she experimented in baking new dishes. Pauline perfected special treats that were genuine to her love ones. Baking the "nut cake," the coconut and guavaberry pies and the sweetbread became favorites on birthdays, anniversaries, and at Christmas. She will long be remembered for these treats.

It was just this past summer that Pauline was planning and making preparations for the fall when she became ill. She accepted the medical reports and then bore the pain heroically. Over the past three months, she prepared for her eternal reward and gave glory to God in acceptance.

This summary depicts Pauline's short life here on earth. To conclude, we are all reminded that God has prepared a banquet for each one of us and that with the passing of each day we are one step closer to His table.
