Eulogy

September 6, 1913 - July 10, 1998

William Charles Hendricks, better known as "Willie", was born on September 6, 1913 to Melvina Hodge Hendricks and Simon Hendricks in Cane Garden Bay, Tortola. He was one of six children.

The family moved to St. Thomas at an early age where he attended Moravian School. Willie worked for many years at Lockhart's Bakery, where he held various positions until his retirement.

On September 5, 1941, Willie married the late Marie Octavie Aubain of Frenchtown. Out of this marriage came seven siblings, of which, five are surviving. Rita, Pearla, Tony, Mary and James.

He was an active resident of Frenchtown, and he was well-respected by the community. He was always available when called upon to assist other residents in various situations. His favorite pastimes included hunting, fishing, watching and listening to baseball games (especially his favorite Dodgers) and playing dominoes with his friends.

Willie was a kind and loving father and friend. He was a good man. His last words to his children were, "You have all been so good to me. I love you all."

Willie died peacefully at the Roy Lester Schneider Hospital. He will be sorely missed. As we pay our last respect to Willie the Breadman, he will always be remembered by his favorite phrase "No Bread Tomorrow."
